Throughout the month of August, a total of cases containing elements of hate speech, discrimination and harassment on various grounds were registered on the web platform WWW.goVornaomraza.mk

Specifically in August there were,

105 (55%) cases of hate speech based on nationality,

39 (20%) cases on the basis of ethnicity,

18 (9%)

cases on the basis of sexual orientation and gender identity,

16 (8%) cases on the basis of political affiliation. At the outset of August, social networks witnessed the emergence of hate speech following the news of Algerian boxer Iman Helif's victory. Reports in the media, albeit unconfirmed, suggested that she is intersex, resulting in headlines such as "Biological man boxed with a woman at the Olympic Games in Paris. The Italian with tears in her eyes surrendered the match in 45 seconds." These headlines, disseminated by internet portals, triggered hate speech and harassing remarks based on sexual orientation and gender identity, as evidenced in the comments.

On August 8, Karpalak commemorated the anniversary of the death of the Macedonian defenders who lost their lives during the armed conflict in 2001. The report that the memorial plaque of the fallen defenders near the village of Karpalak has been damaged, just one day after the anniversary of their death, elicited reactions on social networks, featuring disturbing and hateful speech based on ethnic and national grounds.
